First Reading

The Lord said to me, 'You are my servant, Israel, in whom I shall be glorified'; I was honoured in the eyes of the Lord, my God was my strength. And now the Lord has spoken, he who formed me in the womb to be his servant, to bring Jacob back to him, to gather Israel to him: 'It is not enough for you to be my servant, to restore the tribes of Jacob and bring back the survivors of Israel; I will make you the light of the nations so that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth.'

1 Cor 1:1-3

Gospel

Jn 1:29-34

Seeing Jesus coming towards him, John said, 'Look, there is the lamb of God that takes away the sin of the world. This is the one I spoke of when I said: A man is coming after me who ranks before me because he existed before me. I did not know him myself, and yet it was to reveal him to Israel that I came baptising with water.' John also declared, 'I saw the Spirit coming down on him from heaven like a dove and resting on him. I did not know him myself, but he who sent me to baptise with water had said to me, "The man on whom you see the Spirit come down and rest is the one who is going to baptise with the Holy Spirit." Yes, I have seen and I am the witness that he is the Chosen One of God.'

AND NOW YOU KNOW

At the end of Mass, the priest raises his hand and says something very specific: "**May Almighty God bless you...**" He never says, "*I bless you.*"

That wording is not politeness. It is theology. A priest does not possess blessing as a personal power. He is not the source of grace. Even when he acts in the person of Christ during the Mass, he remains a servant, not the origin of divine action. Every blessing comes from God alone.

By saying "**May Almighty God bless you,**" the priest makes something clear: He is calling down God's blessing, not giving his own. He stands as a mediator, pointing beyond himself to the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

This protects the Church from confusion. The priest is not a spiritual magician, nor is he greater than the people he serves. His authority is borrowed, exercised in obedience, and always directed upward to God.

There is also humility in this formula. It reminds both priest and people that grace is never controlled or owned. It is always received. **The blessing is not automatic; it is an invitation for God to act in the lives of those who are open.**

And for the faithful, this moment carries responsibility. When the priest says "**May Almighty God bless you,**" you are being sent under God's authority, not the priest's personality. What you receive is not a kind wish, it is **divine commissioning.**

So the next time you hear those words, listen carefully.

The priest is stepping aside so that God Himself may step forward.

REFLECTION

The feast of the Baptism of the Lord and this Second Sunday go very nicely together. The baptism of Jesus was all about the start of his mission, and the readings of today **are all about our mission**. To be a baptised person is to be a person on a mission. Today we proclaim the second of the Suffering Servant songs of Second Isaiah. It speaks of the call by God of one who was not only to restore the survivors of the Jewish exile back to their homeland, but to be a light of the nations. Remember we heard at Epiphany that 'nations' is the code word for foreigners, for non-Jews, **for us**. The mission of the Suffering Servant was to bring God's salvation to the ends of the earth. This was the mission of Jesus. Following Jewish interpretation of the Suffering Servant songs, we can also say that it was not his mission alone. In the Jewish tradition these songs are given a corporate interpretation. As much as they apply to an individual they apply to a people. In baptism we become part of that people. **Our mission is to be the servant of the Lord. Our mission is to call Israel back from exile. Our mission is to be the light of the nations. Our mission is to bring God's salvation to the ends of the world. To be a baptised person is to be a person of mission.** In response to God's call, in response to God's voice spoken not only to Jesus at his baptism, 'This is my Son, the Beloved', but to each one of us at our baptism, 'This is my son, this is my daughter', our mission is to join with the psalmist and say '**Here I am, Lord; I come to do your will**' (cf. Ps 39[40]:7-8). God does not want sacrifice; Jesus was enough. **What God wants is our open ear, our availability, our willingness to announce God's justice in the great assemblies of our lives.** To be a baptised person is to be a person of mission. Brothers and sisters, let us give thanks to the Lord our God. Let us give thanks that our God believes in us. From our mother's womb God has called each one of us. God entrusts us with the mission of being light to the world, God nourishes us with the broken body of the lamb, with the blood of the lamb poured out, so that we too can allow our bodies to be broken and our blood to be poured out in the service of our world. *(Liturgia)*


THIS SUNDAY

FOR A SYNODAL CHURCH: COMMUNION, PARTICIPATION, MISSION***Snippet from the Final Document: Part I - The Heart of Synodality***

65. Over the centuries, the Church has also been enriched spiritually by the many different forms of consecrated life. From the very beginning, the Church has recognised the action of the Spirit in men and women who have followed Christ along the path of the evangelical counsels, consecrating themselves to the service of God, whether through contemplation or other forms of service. They are called to interrogate Church and society with their prophetic voice. Across their centuries-long history, the various forms of consecrated life elaborated what we now recognise as practices of synodal living. These include how to practise discernment in common and to harmonise together individual gifts as well as pursue mission in common. Orders and congregations, societies of apostolic life, secular institutes, as well as associations, movements and new communities, all have a special contribution to make to the growth of synodality in the Church. Today, many communities of consecrated life are like laboratories for inter-cultural living in a way that is prophetic for both the Church and the world. At the same time, synodality invites - and sometimes challenges - pastors of local Churches, as well as those responsible for leadership in consecrated life and in the movements, to strengthen relationships in order to bring to life an exchange of gifts at the service of the common mission. age and sexual ethics, which they recognise as a source of life.

66. Mission involves all the Baptised. The first task of lay women and men is to permeate and transform earthly realities with the spirit of the Gospel (cf. LG 31.33; AA 5-7). At the behest of Pope Francis (cf. Apostolic Letter issued "Motu Proprio" *Spiritus Domini*, 10 January 2021), the synodal process urged local Churches to respond with creativity and courage to the needs of the mission. This response should involve discernment among the various charisms in order to identify which of these should take a ministerial form and thus be equipped with adequate criteria, tools and procedures. Not all charisms need to be configured as ministries, nor do all the Baptised need to become ministers, nor do all ministries need to be instituted. For a charism to be configured as a ministry, the community must identify a genuine pastoral need. This should be accompanied by a discernment carried out by the pastor, who, together with the community, will make a decision on whether there is a need to create a new ministry. As a result of this process, the competent authority reaches a decision. A missionary synodal Church would encourage more forms of lay ministries, that is, ministries that do not require the sacrament of Holy Orders, and this not only within the liturgical sphere. They can be instituted or not instituted. Further reflection should be given to the most effective way of bestowing lay ministries at a time when people move from one place to another with increasing ease, specifying the times and areas of their exercise.
