

#### **FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER (11 May)**

#### First Reading

Acts 513:14, 43-52

Paul and Barnabas carried on from Perga till they reached Antioch in Pisidia. Here they went to the synagogue on the sabbath and took their seats.

When the meeting broke up, many Jews and devout converts joined Paul and Barnabas, and in their talks with them Paul and Barnabas urged them to remain faithful to the grace God has given them.

The next sabbath almost the whole town assembled to hear the word of God. When they saw the crowds, the Jews, prompted by jealousy, used blasphemies and contradicted everything Paul said. Then Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly. 'We had to proclaim the word of God to you first, but since you have rejected it, since you do not think yourselves worthy of eternal life, we must turn to the pagans. For this is what the Lord commanded us to do when he said: I have made you a light for the nations, so that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth.'

It made the pagans very happy to hear this and they thanked the Lord for his message; all who were destined for eternal life became believers. Thus the word of the Lord spread through the whole countryside.

But the Jews worked upon some of the devout women of the upper classes and the leading men of the city and persuaded them to turn against Paul and Barnabas and expel them from their territory. So they shook the dust from their feet in defiance and went off to Iconium; but the disciples were filled with joy and the Holy Spirit.

Second Reading Rev 7:9, 14-17

I, John, saw a huge number, impossible to count, of people from every nation, race, tribe and language; they were standing in front of the throne and in front of the Lamb, dressed in white robes and holding palms in their hands. One of the elders said to me, 'These are the people who have been through the great persecution, and because they have washed their robes white again in the blood of the Lamb, they now stand in front of God's throne and serve him day and night in his sanctuary; and the One who sits on the throne will spread his tent over them. They will never hunger or thirst again; neither the sun nor scorching wind will ever plague them, because the Lamb who is at the throne will be their shepherd and will lead them to springs of living water; and God will wipe away all tears from their eyes.'

#### **REFLECTION**

The 50 days of Easter give us time to move ever more deeply into being people of the Resurrection. As we do that, we ask to discern if something is from God. Today's readings offer us some criteria. Acts tells us to ask if the new idea or movement brings us the joy of the Spirit or meanness of heart. Revelation suggests that the proof comes from whether the new thing builds a world where there is no more hunger or thirst or favorus one group over others. The Gospel tells us that what is of God will always draw us toward greater unity among all people and creation and of all in God. Follow these criteria, and we can put the devil in checkmate. #### **WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS**



The fourth Sunday of Easter is commonly known as Good Shepherd Sunday. The rural image of the Good Shepherd and the sheep carried a special cultural meaning at the time of Jesus in a Galilean peasant society, but the meaning can be transported to the twenty-first century. We are being asked to

pray in a special way for vocations which are very necessary for the life of the Church. We need pastoral shepherds for our parish communities. Pope Francis famously called bishops and priests to fulfil their vocations as shepherds who so immerse themselves in their ministry that they "smell like the sheep".

Yet, the call to follow Jesus is a call to all of us to be good shepherds for one another and especially for the most vulnerable among us — children, refugees, the poor, immigrants, exploited workers and victims of trafficking. Anyone who has been responsible for the care of others is like a shepherd. We remember carers, doctors, nurses, parents, teachers and public servants. And we go beyond a commitment to our parish community. We are not all identical. The countless saints who have gone before us are a testament to the diversity of vocations. Good Shepherd Sunday is an opportunity to reflect and ask ourselves: am I only who I want to be, or **am I whom God wants me to be?** Every single person here has a vocation. Every single person here has been, and is being, called by God through the Holy Spirit to offer their special gifts to the rest of the community. What is your vocation? What are your special gifts? What contribution are you making to the life of this parish and to society outside it? (Majellan Living Word)



# LETTER TO THE CLERGY AND FAITHFUL OF THE DIOCESE OF BUNBURY ELECTION OF POPE LEO XIV

Dear brothers in the ordained ministry, sisters and brothers in Christ,

Habemus Papam! We have a Pope!



It is with great joy that we, the Catholic community of the diocese of Bunbury, celebrate the election of Cardinal Robert Prevost OSA as Pope Leo XIV. Cardinal Robert Prevost OSA, a member of the Order of Saint Augustine (known as 'The Augustinians'), was elected as Pope by the Conclave on 8 May 2025.

Born in Chicago, Illinois, on 14 September 1955, a significant part of his ministry has been in Peru where he served as a parish priest, seminary teacher and as a bishop. Prior to his election as Pope, he served as the Prior General for the Augustinians (2001 – 2013);

Bishop of the Diocese of Chiclayo, Peru (2015 – 2023); President of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America (2023 – 2025) and Prefect of the Dicastery for Bishops (2023 – 2025). In 2023 he was created a Cardinal of the Catholic Church by Pope Francis. The context of Pope Leo's life, and ministry, is significant. Pope Leo's life, experiences of leadership and previous ministries have had a global reach and outlook, seeing him live and minister in both North and South America, as well as internationally.

The peace and welcoming love of God were central themes of our Pope's opening address.

His first words as Pope were "peace be with you", and he used the word "peace" nine times in the short speech that followed. This peace, he said, is "a disarming and humble and preserving peace. It comes from God. God, who loves all of us, is without any limits or conditions."

Which leads to welcome!

Pope Leo has already given us an insight into the Church he will lead:

"We have to look together how to be a missionary Church, building bridges, dialogue, always open to receiving with open arms for everyone, like this square, open to all, to all who need our charity, our presence, dialogue, love."

Please join with me in praying for Pope Leo so that, as our Pope, he will draw us all nearer to the love of God, and bring forth God's love and peace to a world that sorely needs it.

Accompanying my letter to you, I offer the statement released earlier today by Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB, Archbishop of Perth and President of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, sharing the joyous news of Pope Leo's election.

Let us, in the diocese of Bunbury, join with our new Pope in pursuing his sacred mission of service to the universal church.
